hearing DeeDee tell her story about what these particular horses mean to her, I asked if she would share her story with you. In her own words:

Growing up on a working farm and ranch in the Texas Panhandle, I have always had an undeniable love for horses and always attributed these feelings as just an added bonus of being raised a "country kid". Every week Becky would arrive at the horse barn and we would go through our ritual of grooming a horse as though we had never done it before. Many months had passed and I had accepted the situation for what it was and kept reminding myself that these hours spent were more for her mother than for Becky herself.

On a cold December morning the Saturday session ended as it always had before with me cleaning the tack and Becky sitting on my tack box patiently waiting for the first sight of her mother's presence through the door. As I turned around I was horrified to find Becky




During the Fort Worth City Council meeting on June 16, Pastor Garcia and his volunteers were honored with a Certificate of Recognition by



It also has monitoring options for parents to track the phone's location or alert you when the phone's owner exceeds a certain speed limit. In Face Of Drought, Golf tries to Reduce Water Use

Today's golf courses use technology to make watering even more precise. A typical golf course may have 3,000 sprinklers buried throughout the different areas, explained David Angier, a senior marketing manager with Toro Golf Irrigation. Toro makes a system that automates all the watering from the sprinklers, down to one-second increments.

In addition, wireless soil probes give information on soil moisture, salinity and temperature, which is important because fertilizers impact grass differently at different temperatures.

The type of grass is also an important factor in water use. While courses traditionally use Bermuda grasses – a popular, fast-growing, and tough turf option -- the United States Golf Association (USGA) has been working for decades to breed and cultivate salt-tolerant grasses, including the inland saltgrass and seashore paspalum. Tolerance to salt is important as more courses look to use poor-quality water on turf.

The USGA's green section is also working to make the traditional grasses, including Bermuda, use less water. Oklahoma State University and Texas A&M University have demonstrated that Bermuda grass can survive on just 60 percent of estimated ET (evapotranspiration: evaporation of water from surfaces and transpiration by plants of water in soil over time) during the summer.

But can golf be a force for good? Despite the fertilizer, water and space it requires, golf turf can help the environment in some tangible ways. To start, grass reduces soil erosion in dusty places. And grasses, like any plants, do absorb carbon from the atmosphere.

Golf courses could be sanctuaries for wildlife. A 2009 study published in USGA Turfgrass and Environmental Research Online showed that 70 percent of golf course land wasn't being actively used, and could be managed to increase amphibian, bird and other wildlife populations. For example, letting ponds go dry for part of the year, which mimics natural annual cycles, would help Frogs* gain hold in ecosystems near golf courses. When it comes down to it, golfers just love the game – and the green. "I think golf courses are important because they provide an open area of green space," said Mike Huck, a California water management and recycled water expert with Irrigation & Turfgrass Services. "We're doing a lot to reduce turf average and footprint."

MAKING PURCHASING SIMPLER

If you're soliciting bids on equipment, did you know that someone may have already done much of the work for you? Many state, local and regional contracts allow other buyers to "piggyback" on them to make purchases, which can make procurement simpler and easier. The reason behind government contracts is simple: time, convenience and leveraging buying power.

Depending on your local legislation and the terms of the agreement, you may be able to take advantage of a contract from another state or municipality. In addition, there are several national cooperative purchasing organizations, such as the **National IPA**, **TCPN** or **NASPO** that work with cities, counties, states, educational institutions, nonprofits and more. Some of these

organizations allow other entities to use their contracts if they join the cooperative.

f you're looking to buy Toro[®] turf equipment, ask your PTP representative what contracts are available. Many cooperatives' websites post the solicitation documents, so you can view the Request for Proposal, the criteria for awarding the contract, if there was a best and final offer, and other details. TIPS: Be sure to look at what the price includes. Does it include setup and delivery? Are there any volume incentives in the contract? Does it offer

financing? Service contracts? Used equipment?

MOSQUITOES

Mosquitoes are inevitable with all the rain we've received. Besides being the ultimate summer enemy to outdoors people everywhere, they also carry nasty diseases like **West Nile** (reported in 47 states last year, killing 85 people) and **Chikungunya** (not as widespread-yet-or as deadly).

There's a lot of information flying around about repellants and especially the use of deet. According to Consumer Reports (July 2015), here's the bottom line on bug repellants:



GO PLANT-LIKE:

Look first for products with 20 percent picaridin or 30 percent oil of lemon eucalyptus; they're safer than those with deet.

LIMIT DEET:

If you do opt for deet, avoid concentrations of more than 30 percent (which are potentially dangerous) or below 8 percent (which may not work as well).

SKIP THESE:

Don't bother with "all-natural" plant-oil repellents. Skip wristbands, too. Neither worked well in their tests.
